Public Service and Popular Writing

The majority of my public service is now comes in three forms.

The first is intellectually engaged popular writing through the *Practical Ethics* website, its *Ethos* blog, and the *Muse* gallery. Posts run the gamut of my interests, from the ethics of wolf management, to discourses of environmental policy, to advising students on aspects of academic life. Some of these blogs are syndicated out to magazines and other websites, such as *Wolf Print* and the Education4Conservation website.

The second is ethics consulting for public and non-profit organizations. For example, I currently work with the US Fish and Wildlife Service on ethics criteria for environmental impact statements and species management policies.

The third is guest presentations for special events, such as a January 2011 visit to the Comparative History of Ideas Program at the University of Washington, Seattle. While there I sat on a panel discussing the status of animal law, gave a university lecture on the film *Avatar* and its implications for sustainability, and conducted a workshop on developing ethics-based environmental policies.
